



### Lisa Myers' Shorebird Workshop

**Class: Thursday, November 15, 6:30 to 8:00pm,**

**Field Trip: Sunday, November 18 from 2:00-4:00pm (special time)**

Shorebirds are a group of birds that come in all shapes and sizes and most spend their time near water. They include ocean species that seldom come ashore and the waders that we find probing the mudflats in the tidal habitats found throughout the Bay Area and along our coastal shores. We'll review the most common shorebirds that we find in Northern California and what field marks to look for while learning about their migration and breeding behaviors.

### Lisa Myers' Duck Workshop

Ducks are a fabulous group of birds. They are large enough to find, easy to observe, and come in many different plumages from the colorful wood ducks to the dapper Gadwalls. Some ducks dive for their food as they eat fish, mollusks, and shellfish, while others dabble on the surface finding insects and vegetation. Some ducks make their home in the ocean, while here in the Bay Area we can see over twenty different species of ducks. We'll review 25 different species of ducks to help you identify them all.

## Vintage bird book article sparked interest!

Soon after the last newsletter came out several people came in with their bird book treasures from their childhood. Rosemary Baum brought in an earlier copy of Neltje Blanchan's book under a slightly different title: "Birds Worth Knowing" and was copyrighted in 1917. In the preface, Neltje Blanchan discusses the "new" interest of birds. "An immense wave of interest in birds recently swept over the country where less than a generation ago was complete indifference to their extermination. Why this change of the people's thought? Largely as the logical result of persistent and highly intelligent educative work by the Audubon Societies, directed by scientific and altruistic men and women, in reaching school children, clubs of many kinds, granges, editors, and legislators." The work continues to this day.

I was rummaging through some books of ours and found one that had been given to me by some friends. It

had belonged to Don Blesi's mother, Marjorie, and had been presented to her in 1921 as a Reward of Merit. The copyright was 1907 and had yet another title by Neltje Blanchan, "Birds Every Child Should Know." Instead of paintings this book has black and white photos of nests and baby birds that are amazing in their detail when you consider that they were taken so long ago. In the preface the author states, "Interest in the birds trains the ear unconsciously. A keen, intelligent listener is rare, even among grown-ups, but a child who is becoming acquainted with the birds about him hears every sound and puzzles out its meaning with a cleverness that amazes those with ears who hear not." There have been many young birders who have heard, seen, and identified birds much faster than experienced adult birders!

As a follow up to researching Ralph Hoffmann and Roger Tory Peterson for the last issue, I looked up Neltje Blanchan and found out

that she was a prolific writer on birds and wildflowers. She married into the Doubleday publishing family and became a commissioner for the Red Cross, then traveled to the Philippines and China. Unfortunately she met with an early death at 52 in 1918 while visiting Canton, China in her Red Cross capacity. The Wikipedia entry describes her books as a "synthesis of scientific interest with poetic phrasing."

Bev Hesse also shared several birding books. The ones that caught my eye were the Red, Green, and Blue books of birds by Frank G. Ashbrook and illustrated by Paul Moller. These were small, paperback books with a different set of birds in each one. They were to be used in the field as they were pocket sized and had an illustration on one side and written information on the other. They were published in 1931 and are still available today through Barnes and Noble!

## Who's Coming and Who's Going

Phone call 8:00am September 28, 2012. "I have three white-crowned sparrows in my yard! It's the earliest I have EVER seen them here!" said our enthusiastic employee, Kathleen Kawakami. She knows when she calls with such an event we will be excited. Even before she started working with us 9 years ago, the excited calls would come when an unknown bird came into her yard. First it was American goldfinch, then a black-chinned hummingbird.

Our golden-crowned sparrows, a single white-crowned, and a single fox sparrow showed up at our house the first week in October. The band-tailed pigeon numbers are way down from their peak of 50 or so this summer. We saw a Hermit thrush on our Saturday, October 6 walk. Now is the time to put more seed on the ground for these ground feeding winter sparrows. They prefer millet based mixes and appreciate it under a shrub to give them extra protection.

Our neo-tropical migrants: black-headed grosbeaks, Bullock's and

hooded orioles have all headed south to Central America for the winter. Cedar waxwings are coming back now as the various berry bushes ripen. Our madrone has set its berries though they have not ripened yet. The pyracantha have turned orange and the elderberries are a dark purple. Townsend's and yellow-rumped warblers will be very interested in your birdbaths and your suet feeders. American goldfinch are shifting in their territory, so if you haven't had them in the summer they are on their way and if you have had them, they are about to leave. The Lesser Goldfinch should be arriving to take their place, but don't be surprised at all their winter plumage. The bright yellow has dulled or in some cases turned to buffy tan. We are hearing early reports of high numbers of pine siskins coming in from up north for the winter. Put out the Nyjer/thistle and watch the fun!

Throughout the year, it is important to keep fresh water in clean birdbaths ready for whoever is in our yards.

## Edible Ornaments and Seed Birdhouses

Dress up your yard and feed the wildlife. We just got our order of seed ornament garlands, seed covered birdhouses in several designs, seed ornaments in holiday shapes, and seed ball ornaments. ## Services available from the Los Gatos Birdwatcher

- **Feeder Cleaning** – Drop off your feeders any day of the week. We clean on Mondays and Thursdays, asking only a donation to one of four charities (Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley, Wildlife Education and Rehabilitation Center, Nike Animal Rescue Foundation, and Friends of San Martin Animal Shelter). If possible, please bring your feeders in early in the day. We will call you by closing for pickup.

- **Frequent Buyer Program**, buy 9 bags 20# or higher of the same seed and get the 10th one free. Coupons do not apply.

- **Seed Delivery** in the local area, free for over \$40 total, \$4 charge for under \$40 total, available on Tuesdays and Fridays.

- **Monthly children's nature programs** and children's programs for pre-schools through 3rd grade. Also great for scout troops. For more information, ask for our new "Educational Programs Insiders Info" sheet.

- **Outreach to community organizations** about birding. We have birding and "Show and Tell" programs ideal for gardening and other service groups.

- **Backyard Bird Consulting Program** - Freddy will come out and see what you have, what you want, and what might work. The consultation is about an hour and the cost is \$20, which will be applied to any purchase of new feeders, seed, baths, or hardware.

- **Birthday parties with Build a Seed Feeder workshop.** Bring 11 of your friends to the **Los Gatos Birdwatcher** (or at your desired location) and build a birdfeeder. Learn about the different birds that are likely to come to the small hopper feeder that you construct from a pre-cut wooden kit. (Includes a packet of seed, use of tools, and instruction.) *Cost:* \$15 instructor fee + \$10/child (availability may be limited)



### Let's Go Birding with Lisa Myers To Cosumnes River Preserve

Saturday, November 17, 2012 - 8:00am - 5:00pm

We'll spend the day at the Cosumnes River Preserve which is located north of Stockton in San Joaquin County. This preserve is a hot spot for many fantastic species that return here each winter, including waterfowl, Sandhill Cranes and raptors. According to their website "the Cosumnes River Preserve was created to protect this land as it is the only remaining unregulated river on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada. In its lower reaches, it flows through one of the biologically richest regions in California's Central Valley, before merging with the Mokelumne River to flow into the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and eventually the Pacific Ocean."


